To enhance your experience, take a look at the notes below.

Books - Buy your books onsite at the Goose because Barnes & Noble (our book supplier) gives the Goose 25% of your purchase price on books bought on-site! That’s a real, live “3-fer” – you get great material; our authors get great support; and, the Wild Goose gets some financial help!

Book Signings - We’re continuing to make improvements in the book signing process. We’re committed to supporting our authors and we’re committed to making Wild Goose a place with lots of thought leader access.

The Village - Take some time to hang out, meet new friends, catch up with old ones. The Village area in and around the Café with food, beverages, and music is a good place to gather.

Convo Hall – Convo Hall is a single tent with a lot of simultaneous, intentional conversations that reflects our commitment to make the voice of the Goose heard. Convo Hall makes space for more than 100 co-creator events—and it gets people connected and talking.

Accommodations Everywhere! – We have our sold-out “City” Glamping, the domed tents near the café, and we have our drastically expanded “Country” Glamping, the domed tents beyond the parking lot. “City” in Hot Springs may sound like a stretch, but city glampers “live” in and among the bustle of the village and country glampers enjoy a little more open sky and fireflies.

Who are we?



Every person is created to be an active participant in the infinite, life-generating, constantly evolving and cosmic process of creation. At the festival, we value and promote co-creation and interactivity at every possible level. We encourage everyone to be creative, to participate, to tell their stories, to “trouble the waters,” to express themselves through art and music and campsites and clothing, to not be simply a passive observer but to be an engaged collaborator.

Storytelling

We love stories. We believe in stories. And in their power to shape our world. So at Wild Goose we celebrate storytellers, and we’re committed to listening. Listening to each other’s stories, in all their truthful, messy ambiguities, and looking for our shared narratives, and how they’ve shaped us—in our joy and in our suffering. We’re dedicated to offering space to challenge the destructive narratives in our world, the stories that breed fear, violence, and control. And to being a place where new stories of restoration and hope can be born.

Radical Hospitality

We welcome people of all faiths or none, who join us in seeking the common good. We are committed to building a community where everyone is respected, valued and embraced, regardless of age, race, origin, gender, gender expression, sexual identity, education, religious affiliation, mental, physical, or socio-economic status, particularly those who are most often marginalized.

We dream of a movement where everyone is welcome to participate. We are dedicated to fair trade, gift exchange, ecological sanity, and economic inclusion. We strive for high standards of mutual respect, non-hierarchical leadership, and participative planning.

We encourage a wide, and wild, variety of expression, and intentionally make space for both joy and lament.

Real Relationship

We endeavor to make room for courageous conversation that grapples with questions instead of doling out answers, valuing and honoring our differences while also moving toward each other with humility and compassion. We make space for interaction that takes apart the usual class and social barriers, that takes down the walls that separate us, that invites speakers and artists and teachers into conversation with the wisdom of the greater community. Non-Violence

The Spiritual Direction team will be available to all festival attendees throughout the weekend. In addition to spiritual direction, the Charlotte Spirituality Center's tent provides a space for rest, prayer, and creative expression via self-led contemplative activities throughout the festival.

The Wild Goose Studio

In addition to hosting speakers, workshops and creative collaborations the Wild Goose Studio is an open and working maker-space! Art materials are available for your use in the Studio or to check out and borrow for use around the festival grounds! Come check out our open Studio space in the mornings, every day of the festival!

Pub/Beer Tent

The Beer Tent at Wild Goose is a sacred space of its own within the festival. Here, you'll find friendly faces eager to introduce you to a new craft brew, pour you a glass of wine, and (if they aren't too busy) hear a bit of your story. Our beers are provided by a vendor in the Western NC area, so the Tent is another way the festival partners with the local community. The "Pub" is a great place to bump into your favorite speakers and workshop presenters, process life with a friend, or simply enjoy a moment gazing out at the beautiful natural setting. You'll find us just beside the main stage, a perfect space to hear all the great afternoon and evening bands. We're also setting up shop near the cafe, so you won't have to make that painful decision between staying for the next session or grabbing a delicious beverage. And when it comes time for Beer n' Hymns, we've got your hookup.

Recovery

Come, all who are thirsty.

Honoring recovery traditions and Group Conscience from years past, we will be using the 12 Steps as first put forth in "Alcoholics Anonymous" in a slightly modified version to share experience, strength and hope with each other across the recovery spectrum in open discussion during each session. There's a recovery group meeting every morning at 8am and every evening at 6pm

Chapel

Beer & Hymns Jax is excited to present the chapel. The chapel is a beautiful contemplative space with limited programming and is meant as more of an open drop-in space for prayer, reflection, and meditation. On the walls of the chapel you're invited to write your praises, laments, hopes, and dreams.

Café/The Village

The Village is centrally located on Main Street and anchored by The Café, a diverse venue with music all day long - and some late night activities. There's a beer vendor right next door and a few food trucks. Come, sit, enjoy a conversation or move in a little closer to enjoy some great music

The Labyrinth: A Journey to Deep Connection

The Labyrinth has long been a symbol of wholeness, birth and rebirth. For some Native peoples, it symbolizes the womb; for others it illustrates the story of emergence, of life's cycles and the choices which confront us on our life's pilgrimage. This year's labyrinth invites us to journey deeper as we seek connection: connection to ourselves, to each other, and to the Divine spark which dwells at the center of us all. Join us as we surrender to the path of the labyrinth and walk for wholeness, co-creation of beauty, and the hope of new life we carry in our hearts.

The Labyrinth is located by the river and open all day every day.

Mama Bear Den

The stories of parents disowning their LGBTQ+ 'kids' are numerous and heartbreaking. Stories like these inspire these Mama Bears and allies, to stand in the gap, affirming and embracing our LGBTQ+ kids and the community.

We're thrilled to have the opportunity to do just that at this year's Wild Goose and couldn't be more excited! We've created a space in campsite #431 we're calling the "Mama Bear Den." During the weekend, Mama Bears and allies will be available to listen, provide encouragement, give hugs, offer homemade cookies, and have cold water available.

Just like all attendees, we look forward to taking part in all the Goose has to offer, so if we're not at the site when you stop by, we'll try to leave word of where you might find us. The Mamas and allies will also be donning identifying pins and shirts throughout the weekend, and are always ready to hug on the fly!

The Mama Bear Den crew is thrilled to be Co-Creators at this year's Wild Goose!

Whether you're a hugger, a high-fiver, or a fist-pumper, we're looking forward to meeting you! The Mama Bear Den is located in campsite #431.

Spirit of Harm Reduction

This year in partnership with local harm reduction and faith leaders, we have space dedicated to addressing overdose, substance use, and stigma. Visit the Faith in Harm Reduction gathering space located on Main Street to gather the spiritual and practical resources needed to respond.

Harm Reduction is an approach to substance use that centers the dignity and health of people who use drugs. Harm reduction is holy, faith-full resistance, rooted in love and unapologetically insistent on justice. It is a hospitality that seeks people out, meets them where they are and invites them into a caring community.

In 2017, over 72,000 people in the US died of an accidental overdose. This crisis has hit some regions and communities harder than others. Appalachian states, rural communities, and communities of color have been struggling to get access to the resources needed to keep their loved ones alive.

As people of faith, we must respond. We know that all people are beloved by God and every life is worth saving. This includes people who use drugs.

Imagine a community where everyone survives and thrives, where people who use drugs aren't left suffering alone. Together we can answer this prayer.

Wild Goose Virtual Cinema

Worship

If you are looking to experience liturgy and worship Goose-style, here are some highlights of our programming at this year's festival.

7 AM at the River: Down to the River to Pray on Friday and sitting birdsong meditation on Saturday.

6 PM in the Café: Friday night we have the Goose's first ever Jazz Vespers service, while Saturday will be led by Taizé Together. (Taizé will also be worshiping in the River on Friday at 6pm.)

11 PM in the Café: Late night worship with the Atlanta Bar Church on Friday night and Nine Beats Collective on Saturday.

And more...Friday at 3 PM is a Charismystical Dance Worship experience in the River. Catholic Mass is Sunday morning in the Portal tent at 9 AM and there will be liturgy happening in the Episcopal Tent throughout the weekend so check there for more information.

Don't miss... the closing communion service on Main Stage Sunday from 11 AM with preaching by Bishop Yvette Flunder and music from Beth Nielsen Chapman and others.

We do believe that worship and prayer come in many diverse shapes and forms, and that the Spirit will be moving in all kinds of ways this weekend, so pay attention to what is happening all around the festival and within your soul.

KIDS PROGRAM

Registration and Parent Preview: Thursday from 4 to 6 p.m.

Ages: Kids Ages 3 to 12 (*must be potty-trained*)

Morning Sessions Friday and Saturday: 9:45 a.m. and (repeated at) 11 a.m.*

*No programming for kids ages 3–5 at the 11 a.m. session

Afternoon Session Friday and Saturday: 2 p.m.

In the Kids Tent we focus on creativity and finding our place in the larger stories of God's people. Using the Godly Play method as a foundation, we'll sing, share stories, wonder together and have a time of free art response.

Equipped with a secure check-in system, the program is facilitated by a team of volunteers, all of whom have received background checks. Each family will be assigned a number to be written on their wristbands upon registration. All adults with matching numbers will be able to pick up their child(ren). Wristbands MUST be worn by the whole family in order to drop off and pick up kids.

Sessions are limited capacity, so parents should register Thursday night or (as possible) sign up for the following day's sessions by the end of that afternoon's session. A limited number of slots may be available for those with day passes.

Fun, age appropriate activities are offered, but this is anything but a babysitting service. The kids will enjoy intentional community with other kids and adults while playing and discovering meaning together.

Workshop on Godly Play, Scripture and Wonder

Is it possible to play with Scripture? Godly Play invites imagination, stillness, and spirit to coalesce in a variety of ways. Inspired by Maria Montessori's deep trust of each child's inner teacher, this method of spiritual guidance invites all-comers to listen and play with the Bible in fresh ways and is most at home with those who value story and wonder—families, churches, at hospital bedsides and so much more. (Even in the Goose's Kids Tent for the last 4 years!) Join Godly Play Foundation Trainers as we share a Godly Play-style story from Scripture, wonder verbally together, make individual art responses, and share resources for developing this approach in your setting at work or at home.

Kids Program Info

Secure check-in system:

Each family will be assigned a family number to be written on their families' wristbands upon registration. All adults with matching numbers will be able to pick up their child(ren). Wristbands MUST be worn by the whole family in order to drop off and pick up kids.

The entire Kids Tent area is fenced in so that none of our flock wanders during the session! At each session, there will be volunteers designated to a small group of kids. There will be additional volunteers handling check-in, and volunteers designated to help with transitioning kids out of each session.

YOUTH TENT

The Youth Tent is on the river road, but you'll find the youth (ages 13–18) following their flag all over the Festival Grounds. From swimming to joining in select adult programming, the youth are always on the move. Show up at the Youth Tent Thursday at 5 pm to join up with your peers.

What You Need to Know

While making Hot Springs our home this week, we want to be respectful of our neighbors, the land, and the local community. We offer this set of guidelines to help make the Wild Goose Festival a safe and friendly place.

Leave No Trace

If you bring it with you, take it home. Please use refillable water containers. There are spigots providing good drinking water around the site.

Share the Well

Water spigots are at campsites, beer pavilion, and areas along the river side of the grounds. This water is delicious, so fill your water bottles and stay hydrated!

Ice

Ice will be available for sale 9am-11am and 3pm-6pm near the old store. 12pm-2pm from the Beer Tent.

Message Board

There will be a message board available near the caboose, at cocreator/volunteer registration, if you need to leave a note for someone.

Vehicles/RVs/Parking

For safety, comfort, and the environment, vehicles are not permitted on-site between 5 p.m. Thursday and 11 a.m. Sunday.

Vehicles parked in "no parking" zones will be towed by a professional towing service to a parking area on-site; vehicle driver/owner will be responsible for the towing cost.

RVs and camping vehicles must remain parked for the duration of the festival.

Bikes

Please walk bikes through the pathways around the Main Stage area. Use caution and consideration for pedestrians and children. Bicycles must have lights after dark.

Alcohol

Please consume responsibly and respectfully. Alcohol may only be openly consumed in designated areas or at your campsite. If you are consuming alcohol at the stages or tents, please keep it in a cup or cozy. Alcohol may not be taken from the campground to venues in town.

Intoxication

Public intoxication and illegal drugs are not acceptable. Those violating this rule will be asked to leave the site and not permitted re-entry.

Disruptive Behavior

We reserve the right to intervene in disruptive behavior.

Noise

No radios, amplified music, generators, or idling vehicles will be allowed.

Pets

Sorry, no animals except service animals. HSRS is a pet-friendly campsite year-round, but does not permit animals at festival events on site.

Festival Site Closes 2 PM Sunday

Please respect the business of our hosts and vacate by then. Like they say, "You don't have to go home, but 'ya can't stay here" unless, of course, you'd like to set up camping reservations at the HSRS office across the street. Then, stay as long as you like!

Shuttle

There are six golf cart shuttle stops on the festival grounds for anyone desiring a lift. We have four carts, the most ever, dedicated exclusively to on-site festival transportation. Sorry, in most cases, golf carts not dedicated to transportation are not available to "hitch a ride."

ATMs

There is an ATM located next to the bookstore. There are also ATMs in town.

Emergency Phone

Cell coverage may be spotty at best, depending on your carrier. The phone in the guard shack (828-622-7598) is available for emergency use 24 hours a day. If a message is left for you there, a notice will be posted.

Security

The Madison County Sheriff's Department is on hand during the weekend and rangers help keep an eye on things around the festival grounds.

Supplies

The camp store, local dollar store, hiking outfitter, hardware store, etc., have just about anything you might need. A full-service grocery store is located 25-30 minutes away on the way to Marshall.

Questions/Info/Help

For all general information questions, or help, ask at the Ranger Station or Wings Tent by Main Stage, or at the Info booth near the front gate.

Escorts

If for any reason, you'd like assistance in walking in town at any time, a volunteer will walk with you. If you'd like transportation in town for any reason we will arrange it (by the way, golf carts are not allowed on the town streets). For walking or for riding, ask at the guard shack in the middle of the road near the entrance to the festival site.

Safety

Take note of the river and the train tracks; beware of yellow jackets; watch for children's safety, too. We have a First-Aid volunteer posted from 8 a.m.– 12 a.m. at the Ranger Station near the Main Stage. We are guests in this place and there are creatures like snakes that live here. If you should encounter one of these creatures, just remember that this is their home and try to work around them. If this isn't possible and you need a creature moved for safety's sake, either for your or the animal, contact the Rangers.

In Case of Lightning Take shelter

All venues will be shut down. When the lightning passes, Wild Goose staff will re-evaluate conditions and determine when to proceed with events.

Lost a Parent? Looking for a Child?

Locate a ranger, wearing red shirts, or any other Wild Goose Volunteer with a radio and let them know immediately.

Policies

Anti-Harassment Policy

The Wild Goose Festival is dedicated to providing a harassment-free experience for everyone, regardless of gender, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, disability, physical appearance, body size, race, age or religion. We do not tolerate harassment of festival participants in any form. Conference participants violating these rules may be sanctioned or expelled from the conference, without a refund, at the discretion of the festival organizers.

Harassment includes, but is not limited to:

- * Verbal comments that reinforce social structures of domination [related to gender, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, disability, physical appearance, body size, race, age, religion).
- * Sexual images in public spaces
- * Deliberate intimidation, stalking, or following
- * Harassing photography or recording
- * Sustained disruption of talks or other events
- * Inappropriate physical contact
- * Unwelcome sexual attention
- * Advocating for, or encouraging, any of the above behavior

Photography Policy (implied consent)

By attending The Wild Goose Festival ("the Festival") you consent to being filmed and or photographed, whereas the Festival may use your image, voice, and likeness for promotional purposes. "Media Team" ID tags and t-shirts identify official Wild Goose photographers and video crew. Any photography or video taken at the Festival is subject to a mandatory, non-exclusive license to The Wild Goose Festival for use in promotional purposes. Any artwork or performances sponsored by the Festival or taking place on Festival grounds is also subject to a mandatory, non-exclusive license to The Wild Goose Festival for use in promotional purposes.

A Jew and a Gentile

Two podcasters/bloggers, one Jewish and one Christian, discussing faith, cigars, depression, cigars, social justice, cigars, and other interfaith issues. Oh, and cigars.

Charles Bretan, "The Jew": Both of my parents were Jewish, but that is not what makes me a Jew. I am a Jew because I choose to be: because I choose to live my life in a Jewish way. I choose to study *Torah* and to live by its precepts; I choose to keep Shabbat and to follow mitzvot; and I choose to eat toasted bagels with a smear of cream cheese, lox (not nova), and a nice slice of onion. Born and raised in Miami, I now live in Greensboro, NC, with my wife, Gail. I am a teacher by trade and by disposition. With degrees in education from the University of Florida and from Nova Southeastern University, I have taught almost everything from composition to scuba diving and from leadership to life saving.

Chris Henson, "The Gentile:" I graduated Magna Cum Laude with a B.A. in Psychology/Human Resource Development from North Carolina State University (1998) with an emphasis in Psychometrics and Crisis Intervention. I received my Master of Divinity from Duke (2001). I'm an ordained Elder (2006) in the Western NC Conference of the United Methodist Church and am endorsed as a chaplain (2018). I served as a pastor for 17 years, first in Oldham, England (a suburb of Manchester) followed by appointments in the Piedmont-Triad of NC. I'm the former Pastor-in-Residence of the Wesley-Luther Fellowship at UNC Greensboro, an LGBTQ-inclusive ministry. I served as a chaplain at Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center caring for the substance abuse patients and adult behavioral health patients. I now work as a hospice chaplain. I'm also a husband to Summer, a father to Sophie, an admitted cigar-aronist, a creative, a subversive, who is living with clinical depression.

Abby Norman is a former teacher and current pastor of a small church in Atlanta. After almost ten years of teaching she went back to school to pursue her

MDIV and before she finished she was piloting an urban revitalization on the south side of the city. The wild thing is it seems to be working. 
When Elizabeth Jeffries found herself grasping for a way to affirm life in the absence of theological

This loss of faith, combined with her concrete understanding of natural phenomena inspired her to explore the patterns that underlie these phenomena. She share the culmination and fruit of this exploration in her book, inviting others to find affirmation for their own lives in nature as well.


Emily Griffin

In 1995 in the panhandle of Florida, a spiritual awakening, known as the Brownsville Revival, drew thousands of seekers who would wait in line all day in the hopes of having a legitimate spiritual experience. Shortly thereafter a Bible college


She has pioneered a holistic approach to health, Akashic Integration, which







Gun violence is a public health crisis. It is also a spiritual and moral crisis.

In the US, We have nearly 5 times more gunshops than McDonald restaurants. More Americans have died from guns in the US in the last fifty years than in all the wars in American history. In the US, we manufacture 9.5 million guns a year, 26,000 a day, 18 per minute, one gun every 3 seconds. With less than 5% of the world's population, the people of the US own nearly half the world's guns. America also has the most annual gun deaths—homicide, suicide, and accidental gun deaths—at 105 per day, or more than 38,000 per year.

Some people say it's a heart problem. Others say it's a gun problem. We say it's both. And God changes hearts, but people change laws.

Beyond Design: A Systems Approach

Victor Udoewa, Bianca Flokstra

"I get the why for the social justice work we need to do. The question is really the how."

If that's a statement you find yourself making, you may enjoy this session which is focused on how to solve social issues in your community or city (not why you need to do so). So many of us have started an initiative or program to address a problem in our city, county, or community, only to see the problem reappear after it was solved. Or solving the problem created 3 more like a weird game of "whack-a-mole." Or the very intervention or solution you tried actually made the problem worse.

Many of us thought introduction of design thinking or human-centered design into community and international development might be the magic touch or "silver bullet" that would help us reduce and eliminate all of our social problems, but that did not happen. The problem is that design thinking is great at specific problems with profit-making potential but not sufficient for interconnected systems of relationships and forces like you might find in a social community or city in areas like health, education, etc.

If you want to know how to choose and implement the most effective and useful intervention to solve a social ill in your community, you need a systems thinking approach. We will introduce you to a robust systems practice. You'll learn how you can gain clarity about a particular system, map it, and then through analysis determine the highest-impact leverage points in the system in order to act strategically and unlock positive change within the system. This will allow you to address the actual underlying, root, systemic causes of the problems you are facing. Then once you have performed some intervention you will continue to adapt and learn, remapping the system as it changes in response to your actions as well as the actions of everyone in the system.

Even (social) justice needs to be strategic. With a proper mapping of the system, it can definitely can be.

Typical of the bisexual experience, bisexuality is often erased in theology, even in books and articles constructing a queer theology. Similar to the "gender oblivion" described by Teresa Berger in the field of liturgical theology, we can also point to a sort of "orientation oblivion" whereas theology has thus far on the whole refused to acknowledge the specificity of the bisexual experience and how it relates to the liturgy, practicing a kind of white-washing of sexuality and denial of the ways that sexuality influences spirituality. A bisexual-specific liturgical theology is necessary because, as M. Shawn Copeland writes, "If my sister's mark of sexuality must be obscured....we are not the flesh of Christ." This presentation, focused on liturgical theology in particular, will be one part of what I hope will be a larger attempt at constructing a bi-specific theology based in an exploration of the ways that bisexual people's experience can be put in conversation with our understanding of liturgy. This creative form of interpretation will be inspired by both queer theology and feminist theology and their contributions to the field of liturgical theology. Because bisexual women experience some of the highest rates of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, this paper will also pay special attention to the intersections of trauma theory and liturgical theology's ability to support healing.

The scope of this presentation will be focused primarily around three elements of the bisexual experience; the breaking of binaries, drawing into visibility that which was previous invisible, and surviving trauma. Each element will draw upon other important works of liturgical theology and reinterpret major points through a bisexual lens in hopes of inspiring the theological imagination.

The white savior complex (WSC) leaves no white person untouched. In an off-the cuff-series of tweets that struck a nerve in many, novelist Teju Cole summed up it up like this: "The

white savior supports brutal policies in the morning, founds charities in the afternoon, and receives awards in the evening. The banality of evil transmutes into the banality of sentimentality. The world is nothing but a problem to be solved by enthusiasm."

In this session, we will discuss questions such as: what is the deeper narrative that drives the attitudes, beliefs, and assumptions that have given rise to this nearly ubiquitous phenomenon on the white dominant culture? What are some of the psychological and historical mechanisms that drive it? Is there any hope of transcending it?

The polity of The Episcopal Church resulted in the path towards full inclusion of LGBTQ+ persons in The Episcopal Church to be an internal journey and struggle. Those involved have remained members of the church, both lay and ordained, as they engaged in the struggle as their

authentic selves. Clergy were not defrocked when they came out of the closet. In most situations lay leaders were not

removed because they were queer. (There have been some exceptions.) This is rather different from most faith communities.

The presentation will discuss the journey that began in the 1970's and continues to this day as being LGBTQ+ becomes less and less an issue for the vast majority of the church. The results of this struggle has led from the closet to being elected representatives on the convention floor of the church at large as well as at regional and local levels. This has resulted in the

ordination of openly LGBTQ+ deacons, priests, and bishops and lay leaders at all levels of the church.

Creative Tensions

Victor Udoewa, Bianca Flokstra

Creative Tensions is an interactive dialogue, a physically active, collective conversation where participants indicate where they stand on a question or issue by the place they stand in the room. Instead of the audience watching a speaker or panel discuss a topic, the Creative Tensions format invites the entire audience into the conversation, through movement. An interactive way to approach group conversation, Creative Tensions is a method for inclusive conversation and a way to show both where our differences and similarities lie but with specificity and nuance. Creative Tensions prompts reflection, invites openness, and celebrates the rare moment when someone changes their mind. Most importantly it stokes curiosity, promotes optimism, and inspires real empathy in participants.

The way we practice it, we start in large room with a line down the middle, separating it in two parts. Everyone is standing while the moderator offers a prompt or question. The tension is created by two possible answers and the spectrum of answers in between. Participants then choose where to stand based on how they interpret the question, how they interpret the answers and where along the spectrum they believe they lie (or stand). At that point, the fun begins. The moderator gets a volunteer to tell why they are standing where they are standing and invites others to move in response to any shared answers (whether it changes their mind or enriches their position or causes them to understand the question or answer in a different light). From then on the moderator may ask others who move in response, why they moved, while allowing others to respond why they didn't, all while inviting others to continue moving in response to what they are hearing and sparking more and new conversations. All of this is facilitated with microphones so all can hear the openly shared responses.

We usually organize the prompts or questions around a theme so that some questions or prompts build on previous ones or provide a twist on a previous one. This allows an even greater depth of conversation than if we had questions and prompts on random topics, starting at the surface level with each one.

The physical form activates people viscerally, places them in close proximity to one another, and encourages eye-contact — all of which enhance one's ability to hear and absorb perspectives that may differ from one's own. The volleying nature of the conversation, which evenly engages audience and speakers alike, sparks a desire to hear from as many people as possible. Lastly, the invitation to move if one's perspective shifts during the conversation, opens participants to the possibility of change, a crucial step toward a growth mindset, learning, and adopting an optimistic point of view. Beyond being educational, it's also just fun and focuses and brings the body into connection with the heart and mind while navigating different issues.

THEN, reflection on potential ways forward. We combine a brief presentation and a bit of role play with conversation - and maybe even non-violent, peaceful debate! This is not an "expert lecture" but a passionate offering to share and collaborate with others who are engaged in escaping the theology of a wrathful, angry, vengeful God which dominates so much of American Christianity today. A bibliography will be provided participants.



Faithful Christianity, Beyond Religion





Label Resistance – Tying Silk and Story

Laura Norton

This is a participatory art experience and story sharing opportunity with the goal of addressing mistaken assumptions people make about us with our various identities, to create further understanding and empathy.

People who participate (artmaking storytellers!) will be invited to work with a strip of silk to complete the sentence: "Even though I am... (tall/queer/pregnant/a homeschooler/a grandpa/Asian/a teenager/undocumented/over 60/Muslim/tattooed/a Republican, etc.), I also" filling in the second blank with their truth which helps to resist a frequent or hurtful misconception.

The strips of silk can be written on with one's own handwriting, expressing each individual's uniqueness as a beloved child of God.

I envision 6 steps in this session:

- 1) Introduction of the Idea: Misconceptions of identity. Includes the reading of a poem which gives voice to and laments such a misconception.
- 2) Write: Participants feel and engage with their strip of colorful silk, contemplate its ability to move, its natural beauty, its strength despite delicacy; then write their own completed sentence, "Even though I am...I also..." on their silk. More color or designs may be added if desired.
- 3) Share Story: In small groups of 3-4, participants share their sentence (and if desired, a bit of their story).
- 4) Trust/Exchange: Each person may opt to let go and entrust their story to another person in their group, exchanging silk strips (or may instead keep their own strip).
- 5) Empathy/Valuing Another's Story: New small groups are formed, share the sentence (and perhaps, the story) from the point of view of the other participant whose silk strip you now hold (or one's own sentence/story once again), aiming to give voice and value to another's story.
- 6) Tie Together: All silk strips may be then tied together to

form a chain of stories or a weaving of true experiences. (In the tying, written words may be hidden, reminding us that everyone has stories which we can't know or "read" on the surface.)

The liberation of women has been, and should be, a central concern in social theology. Similarly, there has been a rise in ecological theology in response to our current environmental crises. In order to tackle these issues, we must recognize that the domination of women and the domination of nature are connected. In this presentation, I will trace the attitude of domination in western thinking in order to show this link. I will demonstrate that these and other systemic oppressions follow from the cultural tendency to divide the world into a series of false dualisms (man/woman, reason/emotion, mind/body, human/nature, etc.). These dualisms support the oppression of one half of the pair (i.e. the oppression of women, emotions, the body, and nature). This means that any attempt to liberate women through the feminist tradition requires also the liberation of nature. Dismantling these dualisms reveals a new truth: liberation depends on recognizing these links and Christian social theology offers us a useful lens. I will show in my presentation that systematic feminist theology, such as the work of Kathryn Tanner, challenges these dualisms and offers a new way forward.

Low and Slow: An End Times BBQ

Zack Hunt

As a teenager growing up in the buckle of the Bible Belt, I was convinced the rapture would happen at any moment. If I didn't want to be left behind, I had to be ready and that meant never missing church, never sinning, and always listening to nothing but Christian music. But when the rapture didn't happen, my tightly wound faith began to fray. After all, if I had been wrong about the rapture, what else about my faith had I been wrong about? The story of faith lost and found again is the subject of my upcoming book, Unraptured: How End Times Theology Gets It Wrong.

Part memoir, part tour of the apocalypse, and part call to action, Unraptured traces how the Church's focus on escaping earth for heaven has it mired in decay.

Teetering on the brink of irrelevancy in a world rocked by refugee crises, climate change, war and rumors of war, the Church cannot afford to focus on escape in the future when there is so much to do and so many to serve in the here and now. By reimagining what it means to live in the end times, Unraptured uses these signs of the times to help readers reorient their understanding of the gospel around loving and caring for the least of these.

And there may be no better way to talk about this apocalyptic way of life than with BBQ.

Now, I know what you're thinking: What in the world does BBQ have to do with apocalyptic theology?

The answer is a lot.

At the heart of Unraptured, is the idea that Christianity isn't about escaping earth for heaven; it's about bringing the kingdom of God down to earth as it is in heaven. Likewise, being a disciple of Jesus isn't something that begins and ends in a moment of intellectual assent at an altar, nor is following Jesus about waiting around to get zapped away in the twinkling of an eye. Being a follower of Jesus is about living a life of love and service to others, particularly the least of these. It's a way of life lived low (on earth, for the least of these) and slow (day to day over a lifetime, not just in a moment of conversion).

Combining my love for BBQ and passion for reimagining the faith, my presentation will weave a narrative around the process of making BBQ and the principles of authentic Christian living during the "end times" by actually cooking BBQ while I speak.

As I demonstrate to the audience how to make great BBQ, I'll use those techniques to draw out various lessons on faith and the apocalypse. For example, the myth that rubs penetrate deeply into meat sets us up to talk about the importance of myth throughout the Bible. The way a handful of lit charcoals slowly spread and light a pile of unlit charcoal lets us talk about authentic Christian discipleship and the process of bringing the kingdom of God to every corner of creation. The beginnings of BBQ in the American South where the very least of these were given unwanted cuts of meat by their oppressors and found ways to transform them into something truly special opens the door to talk about the subversive nature of apocalypse in the Bible and the book of Revelation's central call to social justice. And, of course, BBQ is if nothing else a communal event, often in the cooking process, but always in the eating, which allows us to talk about the communal call of Christianity and the often overlooked eucharistic themes found in apocalyptic theology.

My presentation will culminate in a contest in which the audience will be broken up into several groups and tasked with designing a more helpful, healthy, and theologically accurate version of the infamous "The End Is Nigh!" signs based on what they've learned from the presentation. The winners will get to eat the BBQ I make during the presentation and will also be given a bottle of my homemade BBQ sauce, as well as a copy of my book.

Recovering from Revival

In 1995 in the panhandle of Florida a spiritual awakening occurred that came to be known as the Brownsville Revival. A school was formed and thousands of passionate young adults left their comforts to bring light to the world. Despite their intentions many students found their life reeling unable to reconcile their systems of belief with their genuine encounter with God. Thanks to social media many of the graduates from this school have reconnected 20 years later and formed an online community to support the deconstruction process (including storytelling therapy affirmative listening) for one another.

Over the past 20 years, many of those in the group have experienced symptoms of spiritual abuse and trauma. A major goal of this online group has been to normalize diverse experiences and give opportunity to share stories and experiences many have not shared in two decades.

As part of this presentation, a group of graduates will be share their perspectives on the impact of revival,

stories of what being “sold out” for Jesus looked like, events that triggered recognition of spiritual trauma and deconstruction, and how the group has worked to create the space for one another to work through their own experience in a supportive and respectful online community.

Around the world tens of millions of the most vulnerable people are left without protection from the injustice that marks their everyday. Whole communities of the world's poor are left to fend for themselves as a plague of violence robs them of their freedom, dignity, and agency. One of the starkest examples of this is the reality of modern-day slavery. Today 40 million people fashioned in the image of God languish in the evil of slavery.

This is both a dispositional as well as a practical enterprise.

(1) The majority of people still struggle to discuss mental health, trauma, or substance abuse. So much stigma, true, but also so much guilt and pain. This discussion will start from a place of pastoral care for people willing to dive into the ideas of these ministries. I have a caveat about this idea of "ministries." I really don't advocate another committee doing another task of social justice. I advocate for ways to fold this kind of strengthening into all aspects of the church as part and parcel of our proclamation and religious education. I will also linger on boundary making, showing the difference between the practice of pastoral care to others that is non-clinical and safe for average lay people. It's not about trying to equip folks to talk somebody off a ledge; it's about doing a lot of things well to avoid people climbing up there. (2) I'm writing a book, Pentecost Rising: Practical Ministry in the Nation of Mental Health Crises. The book will be finished by July but already I have chapters of small ideas and big ideas for congregations discerning faithfulness and change. (3) If you are a person living with mental illness/ trauma/ substance or if you are a person who loves people with any combo of those three, the devil is in the endurance. Relapsing and remitting is exhausting, spiritually exhausting. Fundamentally rooted in the supply of G_d, we can sustain the hard times and live into better times. That's my Jesusification central to the Legion enterprise. (4) I don't have a laptop but if I can work that out, I would show proxy ministries of how to use emoticons, legos, and PaperDolls as tools, props, and proxies for teaching. A goofy lego makes the idea of talking to teenagers about sexual assault a lot less icky and terrifying.

They have discovered how easy it is to sow dissent and confusion in America's free society. Freedom of Speech, perhaps our greatest strength, is laughably easy to turn against us. Wrapping Humanity Around the Abortion Narrative

Kori Meyers

No matter where you find yourself on the political spectrum, abortion is an incredibly polarizing topic. This issue isn't as black and white as both sides make it seem. It's complicated and nuanced. But often, we leave no space for women (and men) to openly discuss their complicated stories around abortion, or for others to listen with open minds and hearts. We've created such a stigma around this issue that it becomes easy to lose sight of the real people among us with real stories. These stories are often kept secret, but secrets make us sick.

I want to create a space for people who have experienced abortion to come together to tell their stories without shame or fear of judgment. Not a space to judge and argue right and wrong, but simply a space to be – to be seen – to see others – to see ourselves. As Brené Brown says, “People are hard to hate close up... move in.”

I'll open the conversation by sharing my own story and then inviting others to share theirs. Topics for discussion include: the pro-life movement's hyper-focus on the pregnancy and not the woman; the effects of evangelical purity culture; the need for authentic sex education; the shame created by the church around sexuality; the lack of female empowerment; the ways in which the church has weaponized shame and the abortion issue; how women are shamed for having sadness or grief about their experiences with abortion (which can be quite common regardless of ones beliefs); the damaging effects of disenfranchised grief; and how even women who are totally fine with their decision still

find it hard to share their stories with others due to the stigma placed by our culture.

WTF Is Happening in the United Methodist Church?

United Methodists made headlines earlier this year for doubling down on anti-queer policies and efforts to purge those who welcome LGBTQIA+ participation at all levels. The majority of United Methodists in the US support inclusive polity, so the “traditionalist” international level decision heightens the stakes for schism. Or are we watching a sequel to the Southern Baptist Convention takeover of the 80s? As a leader of the Queer Clergy Caucus Rev. 
